Agenda Item 4 - B: Learning Communities for School Success Grant

The Garden Grove Unified School District requests permission to apply for the Learning Communities for School Success grant via the California Department of Education. If awarded this grant, the district will be able to enhance our current Goal 2B (Social and Emotional Well-Being) initiatives. The grant supported initiatives may include hiring additional mental health professionals (such as social workers), provide training for district staff in the general areas of mental health and social emotional learning, and strengthen mental/health resources for students and families. Examples of possible training topics include: restorative practices, mental health awareness, trauma informed practices, positive behavior intervention and supports, stress management, and suicide prevention. If approved, the district will be awarded \$2 million spread equally over a three-year span, July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2021. If awarded, the district will also be required to obligate 20 percent in matching funds. The matching funds may originate from activities that the district is currently funding such as the existing School Based Mental Health program.

Education Code Sections 42130 and 42131(a)(1) require that a report covering the financial and budgetary status of the district be submitted to the governing board for the period ending January 31. The report must be approved by the governing board no later than 45 days after the close of the period. The governing board must certify whether or not the school district is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and two subsequent years.

The Second Interim Report for Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances is submitted for the period ending January 31, 2018. This report uses the 2017-18 First Interim Report as the base and provides a comparison of the actual and projected revenues and expenditures.

Based on available financial information, the governor's proposed budget and current forecasts, the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the balance of the fiscal year and two subsequent fiscal years, therefore, assigning a positive certification to its Second Interim Budget. In submitting the 2017-18 Second Interim Report, the Board understands its fiduciary responsibility to maintain fiscal solvency for the current and subsequent two fiscal years. If necessary, the school district plans to implement \$82,164,087 in ongoing budget reductions in 2018-19 and an additional \$52,381,720 in 2019-20 to maintain fiscal solvency.

The Standards and Criteria Summary Review is presented with the Second Interim Report.

Effective January 24, 2018, the State Allocation Board (SAB) approved the increase of developer fee rates to \$3.79 per square foot of assessable space for new residential construction; \$0.61 per square foot of assessable space for new residential construction used exclusively for the housing of senior citizens; and \$0.61 per square foot of chargeable covered and enclosed space for commercial/industrial construction. The SAB is allowed to increase fees biennially per Government Code Section 65995. Education Code Section 17620 allows the district to establish new maximum amounts by adopting a board resolution and holding a public hearing. A Notice of Public Hearing was posted 10 days prior to the meeting. Procedural requirements for the raising of fees are outlined in the Garden Grove Unified School District School Fee Justification Study Report which has been available for public inspection and comment February 20, 2018, through March 6, 2018. If approved, the revised fees will become effective May 5, 2018.

In a Grant Deed dated July 10, 1959, and recorded on April 8, 1960, the Garden Grove Unified School District was granted an easement which is approximately 200 feet long by 20 feet wide for the right of way across the property located at 13650 Harbor Boulevard, Garden Grove, California, Assessor's Parcel Numbers 101-080-27 and 101-080-66. Garden Grove Hotel, LLC "Grantee", owns the real property underlying the easement. The district has not utilized the easement for over ten years, which is located at the northwest corner of Santiago High School extending west to Harbor Boulevard.

Due to its ownership of the underlying property, the Grantee seeks to purchase the easement from the district. To accomplish this, the district seeks to convey a Quitclaim Deed for the easement to the Grantee. The Quitclaim Deed ensures that the district has no residual rights, title, interest, or liability in the easement, and requires the Grantee to indemnify the district against claims related to the easement.

The district contracted with a property appraiser to perform a market value study on the easement. It was determined that the value of the easement is \$15,800. The full appraisal report is on file in the Office of Business Services. In consideration for Grantor's quitclaim of the easement, Grantee shall pay to the district the sum of \$15,800.

Agenda Item 6 – F: Amendment to the Agreement with the City of Garden Grove – Joint Use of the Chapman Sports Complex

In March 1998, the Board authorized an agreement with the City of Garden Grove for a joint use of the outdoor sports complex at the Chapman School site (Chapman Sports Complex). The term of the agreement was ten years from the date of its execution. On March 4, 2003, both parties agreed to an amendment of Agreement with the City of Garden Grove — Joint Use of Chapman Sports Complex which revised Section 18 of the agreement changing the effective period to 20 years from the date of its execution, March 4, 1998, through March 3, 2018.

Effective October 12, 1994, the State of California approved the use of California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) by local governments (i.e. city, county, district, or other local governmental body empowered to expend public funds) for non-information technology products and services. Using a CMAS contract would be a cost-effective manner of procurement for non-information technology products and services.

Public Contract Code Section 20118 et al. provide that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to purchase equipment and services for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such purchases. The State of California authorized school districts to purchase non-information technology products and services from Shaw Industries, Inc. (CMAS Contract No. 4-13-72-0008C) on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The CMAS contract with Shaw Industries, Inc. for floor coverings is valid from July 19, 2013, through June 30, 2018.

It is recommended that the Board authorize the use of the California Multiple Award Schedule with Shaw Industries, Inc. (CMAS Contract No. 4-13-72-0008C) to purchase non-information technology products and services.
