
Academic Excellence

Our performance levels earned us a positive rating on the California School Dashboard.




in the nation to launch a Vietnamese Dual Language program

A Leader in Language Development

Research shows that students who develop more than one language experience greater academic achievements and possess higher levels of self-confidence. This year, GGUSD continued its expansion of language instruction offerings, including:

- Successful 2016-2017 launch of Spanish Dual Immersion Program at Monroe Elementary Language Academy with close to 300 students enrolled for the 2017-2018 school year.
- Expansion of 9-12 Heritage and World language offerings to ensure Spanish and Vietnamese is offered at all high schools and that all intermediate schools offer heritage language programs based on their school's demographics.
- 2nd in the county and 4th in the nation to launch a dual-immersion program in Vietnamese for transitional kindergarten students at Murdy Elementary School.
- 632 students in the graduating Class of 2017 earned the state's Seal of Biliteracy proving they are fluent in two or more languages.

Award Winning Schools & Academic Programs

GGUSD consistently earns state and national recognition for its top-notch academic programs. During the 2016-2017 school year, 29 GGUSD schools were named to the California Honor Roll, 4 GGUSD high schools ranked as America's Best High Schools by U.S. News and World Report, Cook Elementary School was named a national Blue Ribbon School, 4 intermediate schools were named California Gold Ribbon Schools, two GGUSD schools were named AVID National Demonstration Schools, and Pacifica High School was named a Democracy School and earned California's top award for civic education. Visual and Performing Arts programs are offered at all of GGUSD's K-12 schools and students earn numerous awards each year for their musical and artistic talent.

Helping Students to Go FAR

Our annual student survey data revealed that students want additional help building skills around scholarly habits and motivation. Too many students admit to not knowing how to study or feel they cannot learn a certain subject when it doesn't come easy. To address the needs of our students, GGUSD put together a working group of instructional leaders from across the district to develop the FAR model (shown below). It is a conceptual framework that helps teachers improve instructional strategies that teach students to Focus, Act, and Reflect. These strategies around growth mindset and motivation will help students develop the personal skills needed for success.



Facility Improvements

The district passed its second bond measure with 76.3% approval from GGUSD voters. Measure P will fund air-conditioning for the remaining schools without air-conditioning, seismic, and safety improvements and two new athletic stadiums. The Michael A. Monsoor Memorial Stadium opened at Garden Grove High School in September with a spectacular tribute that honored the life, service, and sacrifice of an American hero.

GGUSD is a leader in college readiness and consistently beats the county and state average for high schools seniors completing rigorous college entrance (a-g) requirements.






